Lent is often described as a season of repentance: self-examination, and returning to God. But what if

Lent is also a season of growing—of being reshaped by God in ways we never expected?

This Lent, we invite you to join us for a sermon series inspired by Richard Rohr's *Falling Upward*. Rohr writes about two halves of life: the first half, where we focus on building, striving, and proving ourselves; and the second half, where life—often through loss, failure, or change—teaches us how to let go, trust more deeply, and live with greater freedom and grace.

Through scripture, prayer, and reflection, we will explore how God meets us not only in our successes, but especially in our struggles; not only in what we build, but in what we release. Whether you feel grounded or uncertain, fulfilled or weary, certain or questioning, this series is for you. Come as you are. Bring your questions, your hopes, and your whole self as we journey together toward Easter, trusting that God is at work—even when the path leads downward before it rises.
