

Nativity of Our Lord:

On this Christmas morning the people of God gather to celebrate the birth of the Word made flesh, Christ our Lord. Luke recounts the familiar story of shepherds and angels; John's gospel tells of the Word that dwells among us, full of grace and truth. The meaning of Christmas is made clear: the light shines in the darkness. It is in the liturgy that we encounter the Word made flesh—in the people of God gathered together as the body of Christ, and in the meal around the holy table. We go forth to be bearers of light as we proclaim this good news to all the ends of the earth.

FIRST READING: Isaiah 52:7-10

A messenger races home to Jerusalem with the marvelous words: "Your God reigns!" In comforting the people, God proves to be the best brother or sister (redeemer) they have ever known. Everyone will witness the victory (salvation) of God.

A reading from Isaiah.

How beautiful upon the mountains are the feet of the messenger who announces peace, who brings good news, who announces salvation, who says to Zion, "Your God reigns."

Listen! Your sentinels lift up their voices, together they sing for joy; for in plain sight they see the return of the LORD to Zion.

Break forth together into singing, you ruins of Jerusalem; for the LORD has comforted his people, he has redeemed Jerusalem.

¹⁰The LORD has bared his holy arm before the eyes of all the nations; and all the ends of the earth shall see the salvation of our God.

SECOND READING: Hebrews 1:1-4

This letter opens with a lofty declaration of Jesus' preeminent status as the Son through whom God created the world and through whom our sins are cleansed. God speaks to us now through the Son, who is exalted even above the angels.

A reading from Hebrews.

¹Long ago God spoke to our ancestors in many and various ways by the prophets, ²but in these last days he has spoken to us by a Son, whom he appointed heir of all things, through whom he also created the worlds. ³He is the reflection of God's glory and the exact imprint of God's very being, and he sustains all things by his powerful word. When he had made purification for sins, he sat down at the right hand of the Majesty on high, ⁴having become as much superior to angels as the name he has inherited is more excellent than theirs.

Word of God, word of life.

GOSPEL: John 1:1-14

The gospel is announced.

The prologue to the Gospel of John describes Jesus as the Word of God made flesh, the one who reveals God to be "full of grace and truth."

The Holy Gospel according to John, the First chapter.

Glory to you, O Lord.

¹In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. ²He was in the beginning with God. ³All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being ⁴in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. ⁵The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.

⁶There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. ⁷He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. ⁸He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. ⁹The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world.

¹⁰He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. ¹¹He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. ¹²But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, ¹³who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God.

¹⁴And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth.

Gospel Message

Advertisers regularly try to convince us that we should buy the newest gadgets on the market, especially those featuring the most recent advances in digital technology. We are told that they will transform our lives.

This is partly true. Recent innovations have indeed changed our ways of interacting: we can now make phone calls from almost anywhere on the planet, send text and picture messages in an instant, have live video conversations, and express ourselves with a seemingly limitless choice of apps and social media platforms. Our world has become faster, more convenient, and much, much smaller.

And yet, we know that there is no substitute for face-to-face, in-the-flesh relationship. Seeing a loved one's face on a screen may be a temporary comfort, but we still long to be reunited in person. In the end, nothing beats the real thing.

The same is true with God. We need the real thing. Trapped in sin, fear, and bitterness, it is not enough for us to merely read about God in books or talk about God in the abstract or try on our own to be a good person. We need to meet God face to face and in the flesh! That is why God has come to us in the birth of Jesus Christ, which we celebrate today. Touching, healing, and living with ordinary people like us, Jesus freed them and us from captivity to sin, death, fear, and oppression.

Christ's transformative presence continues in the community assembled for worship in his name. In the hearing of the word, in the water of baptism, in the bread and cup of communion, and in sharing our lives with one another, God in Christ is really, physically present with us. This cannot be bought, sold, or controlled. This can only be received as a free gift. And for this gift, there is no substitute.

Commemorations for the Week

Stephen, Deacon and Martyr Monday, December 26, 2016

Stephen was a deacon and the first martyr of the church. He was one of those seven upon whom the apostles laid hands after they had been chosen to serve widows and others in need. Later, Stephen's preaching angered the temple authorities, and they ordered him to be put to death by stoning.

John, Apostle and Evangelist Tuesday, December 27, 2016

The son of Zebedee and brother of James, John was one of the twelve disciples and witness to the transfiguration. Tradition has named him also the writer of the Gospel of John, the three New Testament letters bearing his name, as well as Revelation.


