

James Gonia elected bishop of ELCA Rocky Mountain Synod 12-25-MRC

CHICAGO (ELCA) - The Rev. James W. Gonia, West Dundee, Ill., was elected April 28 to a six-year term as bishop of the Rocky Mountain Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). Gonia was elected on the fifth ballot during the synod assembly April 26-28 in Colorado Springs, Colo.

Gonia is program director for West Africa, Tanzania and Madagascar at ELCA churchwide ministries. He will be installed as bishop Sept. 23 at Bethany Lutheran Church in Denver.

On the fifth ballot, Gonia received 263 votes and the Rev. Bruce Kuenzel, Bethlehem Lutheran Church in Los Alamos, N.M., received 175. Of the 438 votes cast, 220 votes were required for an election.

On the fourth ballot Gonia received 216 votes, Kuenzel received 117, and the Rev. Steven Loy, pastor of Peace Lutheran Church in Las Cruces, N.M., received 116.

Gonia was associate pastor of Atonement Lutheran Church in Denver from 1999 to 2009. From 1988 to 1998, he was an ELCA missionary in Madagascar, a regional evangelism co-director and teacher and director of Betela Seminary there.

Gonia received a Bachelor of Arts degree from Valparaiso University in Valparaiso, Ind., in 1982; a Master of Divinity degree from Luther Northwestern Seminary (now Luther Seminary) in 1988; and a Master of Theology degree in Islamic studies at Luther Seminary in St. Paul, Minn., in 1997. Luther is one of eight ELCA seminaries.





FIRST READING: Acts 8:26-40

Led by the Spirit, Philip encounters an Ethiopian official who is returning to his African home after having been to Jerusalem to worship. Philip uses their encounter to proclaim the gospel to him. Upon coming to faith in Jesus, the Ethiopian is baptized by Philip.

#### Fruits of Love

The idea of Jesus as the vine and believers as the branches isn't that hard for most of us to grasp. Most of us have watched plants grow, and we understand that one branch of the plant won't do well if we separate it from the main stalk.

To continue the plant metaphor, Jesus is the one who delivers water and nutrients to the rest of the plant. We won't thrive when we're disconnected from the life source. In fact, Jesus makes clear what happens to those of us who separate from Christ: we wither.

Today's gospel emphasizes that we are not planted simply to avoid withering. We are to bear much fruit. Congregations will hear the reading this week, and many will ponder how to translate these verses into action. Are we to bring more people into our church? Are we to go out and create some sort of intentional community? Should we work more vigorously to alleviate hunger and poverty? Are we to be light and leaven in our workplaces?

The answers to all those questions might be yes. Or perhaps no. Let's return to the vine metaphor and think about what kinds of fruit we might bear. Some of us are naturals for inviting friends to church. Others of us would prefer to pray for others in private. Some of us have a passion for visiting sick parishioners, at home or in the hospital. Some of us might be called to create or sustain organizations that provide health care, food, or shelter. Others of us are already being cared for in a nurturing community.

There is no single right or wrong answer. But we need to make sure we're asking the right questions. Are we withered husks or are we bearing fruits of love?

# COMMEMORATIONS FOR THE WEEK

Tuesday, May 8, 2012 - Julian of Norwich, renewer of the church, died around 1416 When she was about thirty years old, Julian (or Juliana) reported visions that she later compiled into a book, Sixteen Revelations of Divine Love, now a classic of medieval mysticism. The visions declared that love was the meaning of religious experience, provided by Christ who is love, for the purpose of love.

# Tuesday, May 8 - Victor the Moor, martyr, died 303 (TFF)

Also known as Victor Maurus, this native of the northwest African nation of Mauritania was a soldier in the Roman Praetorian Guard. Under the persecution of Maximian, Victor died for his faith at Milan.

#### Wednesday, May 9

Nicolaus Ludwig von Zinzendorf, renewer of the church, hymnwriter, died 1760 When he was 22, a group of Moravians asked permission to live on Zinzendorf's land. He agreed, and eventually worldwide Moravian missions emanated from this community. Zinzendorf participated in these missions, and is also remembered for writing hymns characteristic of his Pietistic faith.
