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



This story provides the turning point in Mark's gospel. Peter is the first human being in the narrative to acknowledge Jesus as the Messiah, but he cannot accept that as the Messiah Jesus will have to suffer. Moreover, Jesus issues a strong challenge to all by connecting discipleship and the cross.

²⁷Jesus went on with his disciples to the villages of Caesarea Philippi; and on the way he asked his disciples, "Who do people say that I am?" ²⁸And they answered him, "John the Baptist; and others, Elijah; and still others, one of the prophets." ²⁹He asked them, "But who do you say that I am?" Three weeks ago we heard John's gospel's version of Peter's confession of faith. This week we hear Mark's version, when Peter says, "You are the Messiah." In John, the stumbling block is Jesus' invitation to eat his flesh, given for the life of the world. In Mark too the scandal has to do with Jesus' words about his own coming death, and here Peter himself stumbles over Jesus' words. But Jesus is anointed (the meaning of "messiah") in Mark only on the way to the cross (14:3); so we are anointed in baptism with the sign of the cross.



Becoming Good News

As humans, we all have needs and expectations for which we seek fulfillment. It's been said that the most urgent and consistent desire we have in us is to have our basic and other needs met. And in our fast-paced society, we usually don't want that to take too long!

We have needs and expectations concerning physical things, but also spiritual things, things that we can't touch but can still talk about. That seems to be the nature of the discussion Jesus was having with his disciples in Caesarea Philippi. Underneath his question to his disciples concerning public speculation about him (Mark 8:27) could have been a desire to know more about the real needs of the people. Jesus' question, "Who do people say that I am?" could also have been asking, "What do the people really need from me?"

The question is important, because in the midst of all the public and private speculation about who and what Jesus is that has happened over the past two thousand years, we can't forget that Jesus is also good news. Jesus came to be and to bring good news (Mark 1:15). He opens up his good news wherever people open up their bad news. His talk and his touch are good news. His death and resurrection are good news. Both are the kind of good news that people need to see and hear. The best good news you can be is a living, breathing testimony of God's love.

COMMEMORATIONS FOR THE WEEK

Sunday, September 16, 2012 Cyprian, Bishop of Carthage, martyr, died around 258

Cyprian served as a bishop during a time of great persecution of Christians. He insisted on receiving back those who had left the faith under duress. He also provided medical care during a severe epidemic.

Monday, September 17 - Hildegard, Abbess of Bingen, died 1179

A mystic who was widely influential within the church, Hildegard advised and reproved kings and popes, wrote poems and hymns, and produced treatises in medicine, theology, and natural history. She was also a musician and artist.

Tuesday, September 18 - Dag Hammarskjöld, renewer of society, died 1961 A Swedish diplomat, Hammarskjöld served as the second Secretary General of the United Nations until his death in a plane crash while trying to negotiate peace in present-day Zambia. His journal, published as Markings, revealed the depth of his Christian faith.

Thursday, September 20 - Nelson Wesley Trout, bishop, died 1996 (TFF)

A native of Ohio, Trout served parishes in several parts of the United States before being elected bishop of the South Pacific District of the American Lutheran Church, the first African American Lutheran to serve in such a capacity.

Friday, September 21 - Matthew, Apostle and Evangelist

Matthew (or Levi) was a tax collector in Capernaum for the Roman government. Tax collectors were frequently despised for dishonesty and for assisting the occupiers. Jesus nevertheless showed love for them, and chose Matthew to be a disciple.

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
