

*GOSPEL: Luke 4:21-30

Glory to you, O Lord.

People in Jesus' hometown are initially pleased when he says that God will free the oppressed. Their pleasure turns to rage when he reminds them that God's prophetic mission typically pushes beyond human boundaries so that mercy and healing are extended to those regarded as outsiders.

²¹Then he began to say to them, "Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing." ²²All spoke well of him and were amazed at the gracious words that came from his mouth. They said, "Is not this Joseph's son?" ²³He said to them, "Doubtless you will quote to me this proverb, 'Doctor, cure yourself!' And you will say, 'Do here also in your hometown the things that we have heard you did at Capernaum." ²⁴And he said, "Truly I tell you, no prophet is accepted in the prophet's hometown. ²⁵But the truth is, there were many widows in Israel in the time of Elijah, when the heaven was shut up three years and six months, and there was a severe famine over all the land; ²⁶yet Elijah was sent to none of them except to a widow at Zarephath in Sidon. ²⁷There were also many lepers in Israel in the time of the prophet Elisha, and none of them was cleansed except Naaman the Syrian." ²⁸When they heard this, all in the synagogue were filled with rage. ²⁹They got up, drove him out of the town, and led him to the brow of the hill on which their town was built, so that they might hurl him off the cliff. ³⁰But he passed through the midst of them and went on his way.



SECOND READING: 1 Corinthians 13:1–13

Christians in Corinth prided themselves on their spiritual gifts. Paul reminds them that God gives us many gifts through the Holy Spirit, but the purpose behind all of them is love, the kind of love that God showed us in Jesus Christ.

If I speak in the tongues of mortals and of angels, but do not have love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal. ²And if I have prophetic powers, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have all faith, so as to remove mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing. ³If I give away all my possessions, and if I hand over my body so that I may boast, but do not have love, I gain nothing.

⁴Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant ⁵or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; ⁶it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. ⁷It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things.

*Love never ends. But as for prophecies, they will come to an end; as for tongues, they will cease; as for knowledge, it will come to an end. *For we know only in part, and we prophesy only in part; 10 but when the complete comes, the partial will come to an end. 11 When I was a child, I spoke like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child; when I became an adult, I put an end to childish ways. 12 For now we see in a mirror, dimly, but then we will see face to face. Now I know only in part; then I will know fully, even as I have been fully known. 13 And now faith, hope, and love abide, these three; and the greatest of these is love.

FIRST READING: Jeremiah 1:4-10

God calls Jeremiah to be a prophet and consecrates him in the womb. Jeremiah's task is to preach God's word in the midst of the difficult political realities of his time, before the Babylonian exile. He is to make God known not only to Judah, but also to the nations.

¹⁰See, today I appoint you over nations and over kingdoms,



PROPHET OF THE WORLD

Often we have a love-hate relationship with those closest to us. They make us both proud and jealous. We have high expectations of them, and precisely because of this, they often disappoint us. We want to lay claim to them for being one of us, and yet we can't forgive them for the very same thing.

The Jews of Nazareth have a similar reaction to Jesus. They listen to him speak in the synagogue with all eyes "fixed on him" (Luke 4:20). When he finishes, "All spoke well of him and were amazed at the gracious words that came from his mouth." Yet when they ask "Is this not Joseph's son?" we hear the ambivalence simmering beneath the admiration (v. 22). They are impressed, yet they suspect that Jesus is getting above himself.

When Jesus tells them that he will not immediately work the same miracles in Nazareth as he did in Capernaum and reminds them how God has previously sent his prophets to minister to those other than the chosen people, he awakens their ire: "all in the synagogue," the gospel writer tells us, "were filled with rage" (v. 28). Indeed, they even run Jesus out of town intending to hurl him off a cliff!

Fortunately, Jesus is affected by neither their praise nor their scorn. Concerned with his larger mission and busy about his Father's business, "he passed through the midst of them and went on his way" unharmed (v. 30). Thank God that he works above and beyond our often petty concerns. We may get hung up on personality and group affiliation, but God's perspective is much larger. If "no prophet is accepted in the prophet's hometown" (v. 24), that is for the good. God's concern is for the whole world.


COMMEMORATIONS FOR THE WEEK

Sunday, February 3, 2013 Ansgar, Bishop of Hamburg, missionary to Denmark and Sweden, died 865

A monk who helped bring Christianity to Scandinavia, Ansgar returned to Germany where he was named bishop of Hamburg. He is remembered for his love for poor people.

Tuesday, February 5 - The Martyrs of Japan, died 1597

Christianity was brought to Japan in the sixteenth century by Jesuit and Franciscan missionaries. The religion was suppressed, however, and in 1597 twenty-six missionaries and converts were crucified. Nevertheless, Christianity survived and later prospered.



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
