

FIRST READING: Jeremiah 23:1-6

Today's reading builds on the common ancient Near Eastern metaphor of the king as shepherd. Judah's unjust rulers have caused their people, their "flock," to be scattered. Nevertheless, the Lord will raise up a new and righteous shepherd who will rule a restored Judah.

Woe to the shepherds who destroy and scatter the sheep of my pasture! says the LORD. ²Therefore thus says the LORD, the God of Israel, concerning the shepherds who shepherd my people: It is you who have scattered my flock, and have driven them away, and you have not attended to them. 
An early Christian hymn praises the mystery of the political, personal, and mystical Christ, the one who was present at creation and is eternally reigning with God.

¹¹May you be made strong with all the strength that comes from his glorious power, and may you be prepared to endure everything with patience, while joyfully ¹²giving thanks to the Father, who has enabled you to share in the inheritance of the saints in the light. ¹³He has rescued us from the power of darkness and transferred us into the kingdom of his beloved Son, ¹⁴in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins.


Glory to you, O Lord.

Amid scoffing and slander from those who sarcastically call him Messiah and king, Jesus reveals that to be Messiah and king is to give one's life for others. Here he uses his power to welcome a despised sinner to paradise but puts his own death into God's hands.

³³When they came to the place that is called The Skull, they crucified Jesus there with the criminals, one on his right and one on his left. [[³⁴Then Jesus said, "Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing."]] And they cast lots to divide his clothing. ³⁵And the people stood by, watching; but the leaders scoffed at him, saying, "He saved others; let him save himself if he is the Messiah of God, his chosen one!" ³⁶The soldiers also mocked him, coming up and offering him sour wine, ³⁷and saying, "If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself!" ³⁸There was also an inscription over him, "This is the King of the Jews."

³⁹One of the criminals who were hanged there kept deriding him and saying, "Are you not the Messiah? Save yourself and us!" ⁴⁰But the other rebuked him, saying, "Do you not fear God, since you are under the same sentence of condemnation? ⁴¹And we indeed have been condemned justly, for we are getting what we deserve for our deeds, but this man has done nothing wrong." ⁴²Then he said, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." ⁴³He replied, "Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in Paradise."





REMEMBER ME!

When we come to Jesus' crucifixion, Luke's gospel presents us with a distillation of human nature. We see the scoffers and the mockers, the passive bystanders, the repentant, and the compassionate. Among them, we have opportunities to recognize ourselves.

The mockers have an easy go of it. Jesus, this man who had the audacity to be labeled King of the Jews, does nothing to prevent his own crucifixion. "If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself!" they ridicule (v. 37). Literalists, they anticipate bravado in the present moment, a visual display of human power. They cannot even imagine Jesus' broader, more definitive plan to conquer death and spiritual estrangement.

Like most of us would when confronted by a powerful force abusing its authority, "the people stood by, watching" (v. 35). We often fear to act according to our values, especially if it involves great personal risk. We shun martyrdom and would rather hang on to our lives even if we compromise ourselves. That is why we so admire those few who dare speak out against injustice.

The repentant criminal surprises us. We expect him to be like his bitter companion, echoing the mocking soldiers as he faces his end. When confronted by our own sin, it's tempting to smear it onto others, avoiding responsibility for our misdeeds or a necessary change of heart. But the repentant criminal says nothing about escaping punishment. Instead, he admits guilt and begs, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." Just as surprisingly, Jesus says to him: "Truly, I tell you, today you will be with me in Paradise" (vv. 42-43). In the midst of personal suffering, this criminal and Jesus have found room for mutual compassion. Jesus becomes a mirror allowing this man to see himself anew. Approached with the same humility, what changed vision of ourselves might Jesus reveal to us?
