SECOND READING: Romans 1:1-7

Most of the Christians in Rome do not know Paul. In this letter's opening he introduces himself as an apostle divinely appointed to spread God's gospel. The gospel's content is the promised coming of Christ, and Paul's mission is to bring about the obedience of faith among all nations, including his Roman audience.

Paul, a servant of Jesus Christ, called to be an apostle, set apart for the gospel of God, ²which he promised beforehand through his prophets in the holy scriptures, ³the gospel concerning his Son, who was descended from David according to the flesh ⁴and was declared to be Son of God with power according to the spirit of holiness by resurrection from the dead, Jesus Christ our Lord, ⁵through whom we have received grace and apostleship to bring about the obedience of faith among all the Gentiles for the sake of his name, ⁶including yourselves who are called to belong to Jesus Christ,

⁷To all God's beloved in Rome, who are called to be saints: Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

When his mother Mary had been engaged to Joseph, but before they lived together, she was found to be with child from the Holy Spirit. ¹⁹Her husband Joseph, being a righteous man and unwilling to expose her to public disgrace, planned to dismiss her quietly. ²⁰But just when he had resolved to do this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife, for the child conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. ²¹She will bear a son, and you are to name him Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins." ²²All this took place to fulfill what had been spoken by the Lord through the prophet:





INTRODUCTION TO THE DAY

Today Isaiah prophesies that a young woman will bear a son and name him Emmanuel. The gospel is Matthew's account of the annunciation and birth of the one named Emmanuel, God-with-us. During these final days of Advent we pray, "O come, O come, Emmanuel," a beloved hymn based on ancient prayers appointed for the seven days preceding Christmas. On this final Sunday in Advent we prepare to celebrate the birth of the one born to save us from the power of sin and death.

The Name of Jesus

Mary's son is to have the most powerful name in history. By this name demons will be cast out; sinners will be saved; the blind will receive their sight; hearing will be restored; once useless legs will walk again. By this name, the poor will receive the word that their suffering has been overturned, and by this name, those who grieve will receive the hope of resurrection and life. By this name, light will come to the world; salt will come to the earth; a whole new age will be ushered in.

But for now, the name is quiet. For now, Joseph and Mary are the only ones who know it. The name that will bring salvation to all comes into the world as any other child, without special fanfare, without brass bands, pomp, or circumstance. The name comes only by a promise: "She will bear a son" (1:21). The birth will be ordinary, not spectacular. Joseph is not even given any word that angels will dance and sing at the child's birth, that shepherds will leave their flocks to find him, that kings from faraway lands will kneel before him. He is simply to be born as any other child and, in the midst of that ordinary birth, given this extraordinary name: Jesus.

Jesus, who will live knowing the suffering and joy of life as truly as any other human being, is the Lord who will save "his people" (1:21). Jesus, who will die alongside common thieves, is the Lord who will destroy our alienation from God. We can call upon his name knowing that he has felt all we have felt, lived all we have lived, and died as we will die. We can call upon his name in the promise that he who comes quietly saves in the very ordinariness of his coming. With us truly, he has conquered our sorrow.

Thursday, December 26, 2013 - Stephen, Deacon and Martyr


Stephen was a deacon and the first martyr of the church. He was one of those seven upon whom the apostles laid hands after they had been chosen to serve widows and others in need. Later, Stephen's preaching angered the temple authorities, and they ordered him to be put to death by stoning.

Friday, December 27 - John, Apostle and Evangelist

The son of Zebedee and brother of James, John was one of the twelve disciples and witness to the transfiguration. Tradition has named him also the writer of the Gospel of John, the three New Testament letters bearing his name, as well as Revelation.

Saturday, December 28 - The Holy Innocents, Martyrs

This day commemorates the young children killed by Herod in Bethlehem in his jealous attempt to murder the baby Jesus, a sobering reminder of the evil that led Christ to be born for our salvation.

SECOND READING: Hebrews 2:10–18

Through Jesus' suffering and death, the trail to eternal salvation has been blazed for us. We do not fear death, because he has conquered the power of death. Thus Christ, our merciful and faithful high priest, has the final say over the destiny of our lives.

¹⁰It was fitting that God, for whom and through whom all things exist, in bringing many children to glory, should make the pioneer of their salvation perfect through sufferings. ¹¹For the one who sanctifies and those who are sanctified all have one Father. For this reason Jesus is not ashamed to call them brothers and sisters, ¹²saying,

"I will proclaim your name to my brothers and sisters, in the midst of the congregation I will praise you."

13 And again,

"I will put my trust in him."

And again,

"Here am I and the children whom God has given me."

¹⁴Since, therefore, the children share flesh and blood, he himself likewise shared the same things, so that through death he might destroy the one who has the power of death, that is, the devil, ¹⁵and free those who all their lives were held in slavery by the fear of death. ¹⁶For it is clear that he did not come to help angels, but the descendants of Abraham. ¹⁷Therefore he had to become like his brothers and sisters in every respect, so that he might be a merciful and faithful high priest in the service of God, to make a sacrifice of atonement for the sins of the people. ¹⁸Because he himself was tested by what he suffered, he is able to help those who are being tested.

¹⁹When Herod died, an angel of the Lord suddenly appeared in a dream to Joseph in Egypt and said, ²⁰Get up, take the child and his mother, and go to the land of Israel, for those who were seeking the child's life are dead. ²¹Then Joseph got up, took the child and his mother, and went to the land of Israel. ²²But when he heard that Archelaus was ruling over Judea in place of his father Herod, he was afraid to go there. And after being warned in a dream, he went away to the district of Galilee. ²³There he made his home in a town called Nazareth, so that what had been spoken through the prophets might be fulfilled, "He will be called a Nazorean."







The Baby in the Bread

Two very old legends are told about how the baby Jesus escaped the pursuing soldiers Herod sent to kill him. In one, Mary, Joseph, and the baby take refuge in the home of a baker woman who hides the baby in her big bowl under some folds of dough. The soldiers break into her home, but they do not find the baby hidden in the bread bowl. After the soldiers have left and the family has slipped away, the baker discovers that the dough has risen to many times its original size, and she now has bread enough to feed the village. In another legend, the family has made it to Egypt but is still being pursued by Herod's troops. Joseph advises a farmer to plant some wheat in his field after they pass through it, and the wheat grows miraculously fast so that it is ripe for harvest by the time the soldiers show up. The farmer tells them truthfully that the refugee family did pass through, but they did so before he sowed this field. The soldiers, seeing that the wheat has grown to harvest, believe the family must have passed though months earlier and give up and turn back.

In both of these legends, Herod's soldiers miss seeing Jesus because he is hidden behind wheat, under dough—hidden in bread. They are looking for a baby king who will wield power like Herod's power, a king who will command soldiers of his own and who will rule by fear and threat. They are not looking for one who will feed the hungry poor and who will himself become bread for the world. Today we get to find that king they failed to find, hidden in the bread. When we see him there, in the bread we share, we also find that the dough has risen miraculously, the wheat has grown miraculously, and there is enough to share with a hungry world.

Wednesday, January 1, 2014 - Name of Jesus

By Jewish law, every baby boy was circumcised and named on the eighth day of life, so on the eighth day of Christmas the church celebrates this event in Jesus' life. The keeping of the covenant as well as Jesus' name are signs of God's salvation given to us through him.

Thursday, January 2 Johann Konrad Wilhelm Loehe, renewer of the church, died 1872

A nineteenth-century German Lutheran pastor, Loehe worked to enliven the church with the eucharist at its center, from which would flow evangelism and social ministry. He sent pastors to North America, Australia, New Guinea, Brazil, and the Ukraine.
